## Title Philosophy of Mind: Recent Books on Intentionality

## **Course Description**

In recent years, the venerable theme of intentionality has been focused again in philosophy of mind, by becoming the objects of several new theories put forward after the naturalistic turn of the Eighties and the Nineties. Basically, these new theories try to find a link between intentionality and phenomenology, either by locating their focus primarily at a phenomenological level (Crane, Sainsbury), or by explicitly endorsing, from a metaphysical point of view, the idea that intentionality is a phenomenal property (Kriegel, Mendelovici).

Those theories revolve around a paradox. The following triad presents three hardly compatible sentences. Which of them has to be rejected, and how?

- 1. One can think of non-existents.
- 2. One cannot bear a relation to non-existents.
- 3. Thinking of something involves (constitutively) bearing a relation to it.
