## Ethics and Politics Curriculum A.Y. 2022-2023

The course is open to all Curricula, all years of the FINO PhD program, but is mandatory for cycles 37 and 38 of the Ethics and Politics Curriculum

Title: Metaethics, Disagreement and Relativism

Teachers: Luca Fonnesu, Federica Liveriero, Filippo Magni.

**Duration and Credits:** 10 hours, 5 credits

**Teaching period:** April 13-14, finalized schedule to be provided ASAP. The course will take place in two long sessions.

Where: University of Pavia, Department of Political and Social Sciences

The course will offer an investigation of the most important aspects of the metaethical domain. Moving from the framework of a semantical and/or ontological approach to the question of values and normativity, the discussion will concern the problem of ethical disagreement and two possible ways to face it such as constructivism and relativism.

The general framework of the metaethical discussion in the analytic tradition after Moore is supposed to be known by PhDs (otherwise, a general introduction is offered e.g. by D.O. Brink, 1989, *Moral Realism and the Foundations of Ethics*, Cambridge University Press, New York, Ch. 2).

## Requirements

PhDs will have to attend all lectures, read the assigned bibliography and give a personal, active contribution to the discussion. First year PhDs may choose this course to write their annual essay.
