Title Democratic Hope

Course Description

This seminar will examine the philosophical value of hope; the relationship between hope and progress; the role of hope in motivating individuals to exercise their political agency; and, the emancipatory and transformative dimension of democratic hope.

Course organization

The course will consist of five 2-hour classes. There will be two 2-hour lectures (presentation and Q&A session) and 3 student-lead seminars. In each of the seminar, some course participants will introduce one of the papers in the reading list and lead the general discussion. The students in charge of a text should send a brief outline of their introduction 7 days before the seminar.
